The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) conducts the most visible space activities. For FY2005, NASA received a total of \$16.2 billion (including \$126 million in a supplemental for hurricane relief). The FY2006 request is \$16.46 billion. The future of the U.S. human space flight program is dominating debate about NASA. NASA hopes to return the space shuttle to flight status between July 13-31, 2005; the shuttle has been grounded since the February 2003 Columbia tragedy. Pursuant to the Vision for Space Exploration announced by President Bush in January 2004, the shuttle program then would be terminated in 2010 after construction of the International Space Station (ISS) is completed. The Vision directs NASA to focus its activities on returning humans to the Moon by 2020 and eventually sending them to Mars. The Vision has broad implications for the agency, especially since most of the money to implement it is expected to come from other NASA activities. Consequently, NASA would need to shift funds...
